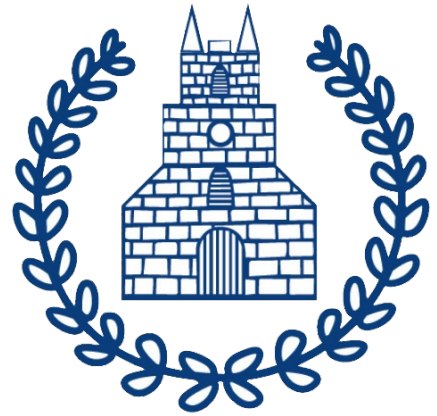

COLLEGE UNIFORM

At Priory Integrated College we take pride in the identity of our College community. Uniform is therefore compulsory. Please encourage your son/daughter to follow the uniform policy at all times. Often good habits in dress show in good habits of work. As items of uniform become worn they should be repaired or replaced.

Blazer
College regulation navy, with stitched school crest.
Skirt / Trousers
College regulation grey skirt with two kick pleats, worn long enough for the hem to sit no higher than 2 inches above the knee OR College regulation grey trousers (not skinny fit). These items should be purchased from one of the stockists listed at the bottom of this section.
Blouse / Shirt
White with long sleeves
Tie
Regulation school tie (navy & green stripe with school crest)
V-neck Pullover or Cardigan
College regulation grey, with navy & green trim (<i>optional</i>)
Quarter Zip and/or Hoodies
College regulation navy hoodie or quarter zip, with stitched school crest. These items are to act as a layer underneath the school blazer. They also form part of the College's sports uniform, and can be purchased from Uniform Store NI, Newtownards.
Socks
Dark grey
Tights
Black opaque tights in a 30 denier minimum
Footwear
Plain black, flat-heeled, leather or leather-look shoes; NOT boots, sandals, trainers, trainer-styles, canvas, fabric or other textile. Should have no emblems, flashes or other decorative additions.
Outerwear
College regulation outdoor jacket, or a plain black/navy/grey jacket with no contrasting stripes or panels (no hoodies, tracksuit tops or sportswear-type jackets)
Scarf
College regulation (<i>optional</i>)



Summer Uniform

Pupils have the opportunity to wear a Summer Uniform through the summer term up to the end of June. All aspects of College uniform will remain the same as for the rest of the year except in relation to the following:

Boys

A navy & white striped short sleeved shirt, which can be worn with a tie. The shirt must be worn tucked into the waistband of the trousers.

Girls

A navy & white striped open necked, reverse collar blouse which can be worn without a tie. The blouse must be worn tucked into the waistband of the trousers/skirt.

Please note that during the summer term, the College blazer must be worn to and from College, but can be stored safely in the school bag or locker during the College day.

***The Board of Governors reviews the Uniform Policy on an annual basis.
Parents will be notified of any amendments to the Uniform Policy for 2023/24
before the end of June 2023.***

Physical Education Kit

On days when pupils have PE timetabled, they are permitted to wear the **FULL** College PE uniform. **PE kit is a compulsory part of College uniform.**

Hoodie / Quarter Zip

College regulation navy hoodie or quarter zip, with stitched school crest, which can be purchased from Uniform Store NI, Newtownards.

Trousers

College regulation navy track bottoms, which can be purchased from Uniform Store NI, Newtownards.

T-Shirt

College regulation navy crew neck t-shirt.

Shorts

College regulation navy shorts. Must be worn under the College regulation track bottoms to and from school.

Leggings

Sports leggings are permitted and should be navy or black, and worn under the College regulation track bottoms to and from school.

Socks

White sports socks

Footwear

Sports trainers, which offer good support, cushioning and which are appropriate for sporting activity.

Outerwear

Pupils choosing to wear the full sports kit to school can wear the College regulation outdoor coat **OR** a plain black/grey/navy outdoor coat **OR** the College blazer.

You may be entitled to a grant towards the cost of school uniform. Please contact the Education Authority South Eastern Region (Tel: 028 9056 6200) or Education Authority Belfast Region (Tel: 028 9056 4000). Applying early is always advised.

We also have a School Uniform Bank. Information on how to access this will be posted on our Social Media and through Parent Mail in July and August.

Technology and H.E

An apron is compulsory for both Technology and H.E practical work. This can be purchased directly from the College.

Jewellery

It is the College's policy that pupils are permitted to wear a wrist watch and one plain stud in each ear. No other jewellery is permitted. Discreet clear retainers must be worn in facial piercings. Jewellery worn in line with the school policy must be removed for P.E and other sporting activities.

Hair

It is the College's policy that pupils' hair should be kept neat and tidy. Hair colour should be naturally occurring. Hair styles that the College considers to be exaggerated or excessive will not be permitted. Long hair should be tied back for all practical work including Physical Education, Home Economics and Technology and Design.

Make Up

It is the College's policy that pupils are not permitted to wear make-up, nail polish or any kind of gel / artificial nails/ artificial eyelashes.

Tattoos

It is illegal to have a tattoo if you are under the age of 18. It is also the College's policy that pupils are not permitted to have any visible tattoos.

Badges and Emblems

It is the College's policy that only badges and emblems associated with College clubs and achievements can be worn by pupils. Badges and emblems representing charities approved by the College may also be worn. In such instances, they should be attached safely to the lapel of the College blazer.

Coats and Outdoor Wear

Coats and gloves should be removed when in the College building and should be stored safely, either in pupils' school bags or lockers throughout the College day, unless needed for break / lunchtime outdoor recreation.

Whilst College regulation scarves can be worn in the building, in the interest of health and safety, they must be removed for all practical activities.

PASTORAL CARE

Each Form Class has its own Form Tutor who is responsible for welfare and discipline in the first instance. These Form Classes are organised into Year Groups with a Head of Year who has overall responsibility for all pupils in that group. **The Head of Year 8 is Mrs J McCandless.**

**The Educational Welfare Service's main concern is school attendance; however they are also available to support Parents/ Carers with any problems their child may be experiencing.*

You are welcome to discuss any concerns with your sons/daughter's Form Tutor, Head of Year or Leader of Key Stage. You can do this either by phoning, or if necessary, making an appointment to meet with the appropriate member of the Pastoral team through the College office.

The Principal, Mrs N Wilson, and Vice Principal, Miss A Watterson, are also available should you wish to discuss any matter further.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Pupils are expected to have the following each day:

- A **fully charged** iPad
- Stationery - pens, pencils
- Diary
- A bag suitable to carry equipment in and any homework set

They are also expected to have their PE kit and Home Economics equipment/money on the appropriate days. If they fail to bring these then the departments will issue a suitable sanction.

Please do not bring valuable items into school. **If mobile phones are brought into school they must be switched off, and out of sight.** The College cannot be held responsible for property which is lost or damaged.

Lockers

Lockers will be available for pupils, with Year 8 having priority. These are allocated on the basis a padlock is provided for the locker, plus a spare key to leave with the Form Tutor in case of emergencies. It is advised that any valuables are not kept in the lockers as the College cannot be held responsible for them.

Lunch-Time/Free Meals

We operate a cash canteen. Pupils are not permitted to leave College at break or lunch-time without having been given permission by Senior Staff.

Pupils who had free meals at Primary School should still qualify for these at Priory Integrated College but a new application is necessary. Apply online at: freeschoolmealsanduniforms.eani.co.uk

College Fund

Parents/carers are required to make a contribution of £40 on the first day of your child's attendance at the College, or as soon as possible thereafter. This should be given to the Form Tutor. Receipts will be issued. Payment by instalment is also possible.

Prescription Medication

(Reference First Aid Policy: on College website)

Prescription medication brought into the College must be in its original labelled packaging, and will be locked safely in the College medical room.

This policy is enforced for the health and safety of all of our pupils.

PE Policy on Non-Participation

If a pupil is to be excused from PE, he or she must produce a written excuse from a Parent/ Carer outlining details of the specific problem and the exact duration for non-participation. If an illness or injury requires more than two weeks non-participation a medical certificate is requested.

All notes received are signed by the appropriate teacher and are kept by the department for reference during the full academic year. In order to ascertain the specific reason for persistent non-participation, a full record will be kept of any communication with pupils deemed as "persistent non participants".

When a pattern of non-participation is seen to develop the pupil will receive counselling by a member of the PE staff. The teacher will attempt to ascertain specific reason why pupils feel that they cannot participate in that or all lessons. If this is unsuccessful and the pupil fails to participate in PE classes, without a reasonable excuse, on three occasions in one term, he or she will be placed on PE detention, usually Friday afternoons. If none of these strategies produce a satisfactory outcome the Head of Department will make formal arrangements for interview with Parent/ Carer. The appropriate Head of Year and the Head of School will be informed of this arrangement.

Medical Health

If your son/daughter becomes sick or injured at College, they should report to the appropriate Head of Year. Your son/daughter will be monitored to determine the severity.

Please note your son/daughter needs permission from their Head of Year and **must not leave the College without authorisation.**

A member of the College staff will contact you and if possible you must make arrangements to collect your son/daughter. Efforts will always be made to contact Parents/ Carers first.

Home-School Agreement

Our aim at Priory Integrated College is to ensure that your son/daughter achieves their full potential.

We work hard to make sure that they leave Priory equipped, with the social and emotional skills needed to help them grow into responsible adults who are able to lead happy and fulfilled lives and be a credit to the communities in which they live.

It is our strong belief that the partnership between Priory, your son/daughter and family is crucial in order for these goals to be achieved.

Parking

In response to concerns raised by Parents/ Carers, the College, and the PSNI, we seek your co-operation regarding traffic congestion on My Lady's Mile at the beginning and end of the College day.

Following consultation between the College, DOE, Translink, and the PSNI, it is requested that you do not park on either side of the road within 50 metres of the yellow zigzag lines. Additionally, it should be noted that a speed restriction of 20mph operates on My Lady's Mile and Church View while schools are in operation. This has been requested in the interest of the health and safety of our pupils.

Furthermore, we ask that you please avoid driving into the College grounds when pupils are arriving or departing.

UNIQUE CLASSROOM EXPERIENCE

Curriculum

Your child will encounter a range of new subjects such as Home Economics, Technology and French for the first time in Year 8, however their experience in Priory will be unique for a number of reasons.

All Year 8 pupils will have **Integration Studies** as part of their curriculum. During this, they will examine what makes us special as an Integrated school, and how our core values of Truth, Trust, Excellence, Empowerment and Respect underpin everything we do in the College.

We have a fortnightly **Pastoral Period** where we explore topics such as healthy and unhealthy relationships, drug and alcohol awareness, online etiquette and safety, stress management and resilience, and mindfulness. All topics are delivered taking account of the age and maturity of the pupils to give them the skills to navigate their journey into adulthood.

Thinking School

As a Thinking School, Priory Integrated College aims to help our pupils to think reflectively, critically and creatively, enabling them to employ these skills and to make meaning of the knowledge they receive. We want our pupils to be able to demonstrate independent learning skills, resulting in high levels of achievement, confidence to learn and gain enjoyment and satisfaction from learning.

The Priory Classroom has evidence of:

- Thinking skills being developed.
- Tools and strategies being shared to support thinking.
- High level question and answering to encourage thinking.
- The infusion of thinking through the curriculum content.
- Pupils having confidence to tackle tasks independently.

The school is currently working with Thinking Matters to use a range of thinking frames to help pupils primarily with their literacy and extended writing. Thinking frames are meta-cognitive tools which help pupils visualise their thinking and then aid them in communicating their thoughts and ideas.



Apple Distinguished School

Priory Integrated College is proud to be one of the few schools in the UK to have achieved the status as an Apple Distinguished School. It is a validation of all of the hard work invested by the young people and the College staff over recent years. In that time, learning across the curriculum has been transformed.


Our Apple Distinguished School status highlights our success in providing an innovative and compelling learning environment that engages pupils of all abilities and provides tangible evidence of their academic achievements. Pupils across the ability range have been motivated, excited and empowered by the wider variety of opportunities for individualised learning that the iPad has provided.

Every child receives a school iPad when they join the College. They will, however, continue to use pen and paper. We know that pupils must have the skills to present their work in a variety of ways. The iPad is used as an additional tool in their learning which gives them further flexibility and choice.




EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We find that an excellent way to get settled into a new school is to get involved in the extra curricular life of the College. This affords your child the opportunity to get to know their teachers outside of the classroom setting, as well as pupils from different classes and year groups. We would encourage every child to get involved in at least one club or activity. This can be either during school time or after school depending on their preference.

RECOGNISING SUCCESS

We want your child to be recognised for their work, contribution to school life and the ethos of the school. We have an Annual Celebration of Achievement each year, however we aim to recognise your child in special Reward Assemblies in their Year Groups and Positive Phone calls home. They can also earn Achievement points which you will be able to see on the SIMS app and on their progress reports.

RESTORATIVE APPROACH

Priory Integrated College is a school that employs restorative practice techniques when there is conflict between people within the school community. This may be between two pupils, or a pupil and a member of staff. A restorative school is one which takes a restorative approach to resolving conflict and preventing harm.

Restorative approaches enable those who have been harmed to convey the impact of the harm to those responsible, and for those responsible to acknowledge this impact and take steps to put it right.

Our aim through this approach is to:

- Increase pupil attendance
- Reduce exclusions and improve achievement
- Alleviate problems such as bullying, classroom disruption, truancy and poor attendance, antisocial behaviour, and disputes between pupils, their families, and members of staff.

HOME / SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

As a paperless school, we no longer send information by post. Instead we communicate using the following key apps that you will be able to download on your mobile device. You will be provided with further information on how to access these apps, along with your log in details, at a later date.



We use ParentMail to send you communications about vital information such as parent consultations, extra curricular activities and the day to day activities in school. You can also report your child as absent using this app and we will alert you if your child has not arrived in school through ParentMail.

The SIMS Parent App is how you will receive your child's progress reports. You will also be able to check:

- Which lesson they are in at any given time
- Whether they are marked present
- Their Achievement & Behaviour points



All homework is set through an app called Satchel One. Satchel One is a virtual homework diary. You will be able to see what homework has been set and all the details for instructions, how to submit and when to submit. You'll never have to ask 'What homework do you have tonight?' again - you'll be able to see!



Homework will be set regularly in all subjects, but might not always be written: it may be reading, learning or researching. Any homework set is expected to be completed carefully and handed in on time.

If you have any concerns with regard to homework, please contact your son's/daughter's Form Tutor.

ATTENDANCE & ABSENCE REPORTING

Regular attendance is crucial to your child's progress and we expect our pupils to be in school unless they are unable to attend for reasons of illness, bereavement or exceptional circumstances. We are aware that post-Covid, there has been an increase in Anxiety Based School Avoidance and mental health concerns amongst our young people. We would ask parents and carers to be contact us straight away if they suspect that this is becoming an issue for their child. It is vital that we work in partnership to put together a plan to support your child's reintegration to school; we can always Accomplish More Together. Please contact the College Pastoral Team to arrange a meeting if you have any concerns.

We would ask that, where possible, all medical and dental appointments are made outside of school time.

All absences must be authorised by the Parent/ Carer. There are a number of ways you can do this. The easiest is to use the ParentMail app and select the Notify Absence tab. Here you can note the reason for absence and how long you expect your child to be off school. This will be reported directly to the College office, and on to your child's Form Tutor. You won't even need to find a pen and a piece of paper!

You may also write a note. Please remember to write the reason for absence and the relevant dates. The note should be given to the Form Tutor, by your son/daughter, on his or her first day back to College after each absence. We would be grateful if, in the case of known or extended absence, you would contact the College as soon as possible.

Alternatively, you can ring the College office and select the option for notifying absence.

Please note that family holidays taken during the academic year could have an effect on your son's/daughter's progress and should be avoided. Work missed as a result of a holiday is the pupil and parents'/carers' responsibility to ensure that the work is updated.

Please note that College examinations missed as a result of pupils going on holiday during term time cannot be sat at a later date and zero will be recorded on their report.

If you are worried at any time about your son's/daughter's attendance do not hesitate to contact the College office.
